VANESSA REILLY (SPAIN)

Vanessa Reilly is a teacher, teacher trainer and author. She has worked with teachers from all over the world and is currently training Spanish teachers to teach in the new state system bilingual programme. Vanessa is an author for Oxford University Press and has written a number of course books for young children – Cookie and Friends (winner of the British Council Innovations Award 2004), Cool and is currently writing a new six level course for primary children. She is co-author of Resource books for Teachers - <u>Very Young Learners</u> and <u>Writing with children</u> (winner of the English Speaking Union Duke of Edinburgh Award 2005).

VANESSA REILLY (SPAIN)

The Text and Beyond

Robert Hill (Italy)

Debates about reading have traditionally been about intensive reading and extensive reading. In intensive reading, comprehension tasks have also led into practice in structures, skills and vocabulary. But – more importantly? - all texts are ideal for exploring CLIL-style connections with other subjects and for raising awareness of intertextuality – how a text is related to other texts and genres – and cultural background.

It's Great to Be a FLT (Foreign Language Teacher)

Simona Napast, Barbara Brezigar (Slovenia)

Our presentation will be based on presenting Messages course books for students from 6th to 9th grade. Why should learning be boring and a nuisance? Why should teaching be a burden to teachers? Both can be fun and a pleasure for students and teachers respectively.

"Hi there!"

Petra Bizjak (Slovenia)

Založba Rokus has recently published textbooks for English in the 4th and 5th grades of primary school entitled Hi there!. In the presentation participants will become acquainted with the two textbook sets, their components, structure, content and extra materials available to teachers in book form and on the Internet.

Teacher Training (Cambridge CELTA) in Slovenia and a Career with International House

Mojca Hergouth Koletič (Slovenia)

Very Young Learners: Project Work: Sports, Dance and English

Learning different skills in the early years helps with whole child development, because learning affects different fields of psychophysical development in similar ways. The key to this learning is the engagement of unconscious psychological processes, such as recognition, perception etc. There are similar processes going on at different learning activities, such as solving problems throughout the motor activities and foreign language learning.

Blending Quality and Learning School in an ELT Class

Mojca Belak (Slovenia)

Last year I turned two classes into learning organisations. I stepped back and let my students take a more active part in decision-making while we experimented with everything, including assessment. That way many students managed to improve their results, but this doesn't mean they all like/d the power they had been given. The project is now in its second year.

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Hear, See, Smell, Taste and Feel English

Bojana Mihelač (Slovenia)

Hear, see, smell, taste and feel English – listen, read, speak and write English. Can a primary coursebook be systematic yet diversified? Primary school materials need to be both in order to keep pupils interested throughout each lesson and give them a system to organize the knowledge and skills acquired.

Creative Poetry Writing

Veronika Piccinini (Slovenia)

The aim of the activity presented is to produce a piece of poetry with the help of a unique technique, which will inspire language learners with enthusiasm for writing and, most importantly, give them an opportunity to learn in a creative and meaningful way.

Last, but not least, the activity represents an interesting way of integrating literature into English classes.

British Life, Language and Culture

Marijana Budeč Staničić (Slovenia)

Having been granted the Comenius funding, I will give a short insight into the course I attended in July 2006 at Pilgrims. The presentation will include examples of different aspects of British Life Language and Culture such as: religion, education, political correctness, Englishness and hinging, teenage talk and the culture of pubs. Practical handouts will be provided and a few photographs displayed.

Giving Clear Instructions – Let Me Count the Ways

ANNIE POLATSEK (CROATIA)

Giving instructions is a skill that takes thought, planning and knowing your audience. As teachers, we're continually honing our competencies for clarity and checking comprehension. Showing not telling helps make meaning clear and addressing various learning styles enhances comprehension. Through experiential activities we'll explore ways to encourage improved instructions and create a guide for this essential element of classroom management.

Chaos and the Language Classroom: Using Nonlinear Dynamics in ELT

SLAVKO CVETEK (SLOVENIA)

The language classroom is a very chaotic place and every lesson is uncertain until it occurs. In my talk I shall be looking at the ways how thinking about chaos theory can help teachers to prepare for chaos and accept uncertainty as a natural condition. Moreover, they should become the key agents of chaos in the classroom.

How to Apply for a CMEPIUS (COMENIUS 2) Grant

Mojca Belak (Slovenia)

If you've always wanted to attend a teacher training course in Great Britain but thought you couldn't afford it, here's some good news. Comenius 2 grants, meant to help teachers keep up with the new developments in teaching, are within easy reach. With some guidance starting at this workshop you will sail through the 15-page application form, apply, and then... see you in Britain in the summer!

Learning Stations – Autonomous Learning

Urška Ravnjak (Slovenia)







MARJORIE ROSENBERG

Get a MUVE on – Virtual Environments in Teaching and Training

Rich-media MUVEs such as Second Life combine synchronous text chat with multimedia possibilities and real-time voice chat to open up a world of opportunity for language teaching and training. In this talk we will examine Second Life, and consider its application in the teaching / training process.

16.30 – 17.30 PARALLEL WORKSHOPS

Mathematics and English Hand in Hand. Cross-curricular Approach to "The Curious Incident" TANJA KOVAČ FLISAR, JASNA KOS (SLOVENIA)

The session introduces the importance of a cross-curricular analysis of the novel and illustrates the connection between mathematics and English. With the help of mathematical topics, a math teacher can help students to identify with the protagonist and the English teacher with discipline literacy. The session outlines the challenges this book presents in terms of reality and the world of autism.

I am going to prove that students like reading books if they are properly motivated. Last year my institution took part in the Comenius Language Project 'Reading Books'. We cooperated with a similar special needs school from Finland. During the project we checked the students' reading habits and interests, chose a book to read, discussed it and then made a film.

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A MOMENT TO RELAX

A Moment to Relax

If you look closely to the Conference Programme you will see that we prepared some special treats for you – moments to relax your mind, body and soul. There are three opportunities which you shouldn't miss (since they are included in the conference fee). On Friday you can try Autogenic Training and during dinner your hands can enjoy a Paraffin bath. On Saturday you will be able to try out the Gong therapy. In order to choose which treat suits your needs best explore some basic ideas behind these treatments... and then let yourself go.

Autogenic training (Friday, 14.00)

Autogenic training is a term for a relaxation technique developed by the German psychiatrist Johannes Schultz first published in 1932. It usually involves a series of sessions in which the patients learn to relax their limbs, heart, and breathing. The goal is to induce a pleasant, warm feeling throughout most of the body and induce a feeling of coolness in the forehead. The technique is used against stress-induced psychosomatic disorders.

Schultz emphasized parallels to techniques in yoga and meditation. However, unlike some forms of yoga and meditation, autogenic training is devoid of any mysticism. It is a method for influencing one's autonomic nervous system.

Paraffin bath for your hands (Friday, 19.00)

Paraffin bath therapy is one of the most effective methods of applying heat to relieve pain and stiffness. A warm paraffin bath relaxes muscles, relieves stiffness and muscle spasms, and stimulates circulation. The warm paraffin also moisturizes for healthier looking, softer skin.

This is a wonderful heat therapy that provides symptomatic relief of pain and is optimal for patients suffering from arthritis, bursitis, muscle spasms, pain, stiffness, and chronic joint inflammation. It may be prescribed for post-fracture or post-dislocation treatment; for sprains and strains; for restriction of motion due to scar tissue; and also for some other conditions.


Gong therapy (Saturday, 14.00)
